Saralu Mary (Knisely) Chamberlain, age 101, a vibrant and creative woman, passed away July 17, 2021. Born in Channing, MI, on October 26, 1919, Saralu moved as a child with her parents and three siblings to Jackson, MI, where she met her future husband, Gordon, while attending Jackson High School. It was not until several years later that they became an "item" as they sang together in the Calvary United Methodist Church choir directed by Gordon's mother. They were married in 1945 after Gordon returned from his WWII duties and moved to Lansing in 1949 where they raised their four children.

Saralu was at her best when she was doing for others. She excelled as a homemaker, finding, among other things, fun ways to entertain her children on rainy days and cooking intricate dinners every night. She believed in equality for everyone and voted in last November's election.

Saralu was predeceased by her parents, Myrtle and Holton Knisely, her three siblings, her husband Gordon, her son Albert, daughter Carol Parker, and grandson Miles Chamberlain. She is survived by her daughters Cynthia Chamberlain (Thomas Marple) of Sequim, WA, and Barbara Fuller (Jerry) of DeWitt, six grandsons and seven greatgrandchildren who all thought the world of her.
