Happy Easter, Mayflower Family! There is no event, season, or theology that is more significant for Christians than Easter. And while Easter doesn't carry the same cultural significance as Christmas, there is still an amazing amount of money spent on Easter in our country. On average, each American will spend \$150 to celebrate the holiday. The total amount of money spent on the holiday is a staggering \$18.2 billion dollars! Food tops the list at \$5.7 billion, clothing comes in at \$3.2 billion, \$2.9 billion will be spent on gifts, \$2.6 billion for candy, \$1.1 billion shelled out for decorations, and finally, \$780 million on greeting cards.
