Present were Pastor Mark, Music Director Barb Fuller, co-chairs of Missions and Outreach Roger Kennedy and Betty Briggs, Gail Sawyer represented Deacons chair Jen Hall along with Christian Education chair and Treasurer Ruth Pasch. Others present were Church Clerk Lorraine Finison, Vice Moderator Tom Hacker and Moderator Jerry Fuller.

Missions and Outreach: Roger and Betty reported that Crop Walk is October 13 and a sign-up sheet for sponsors will be forthcoming. The Mexican potluck lunch scheduled for October 20 will be a fund-raising event for those who will be traveling to the Amigos en Cristo mission in November. Budget requests are being prepared for Harvest Festival, Mission Meals and the mission trip. They are planning a month-long campaign to collect tissues and wipes and explore other needs through the Lewton School contact.

## Music Notes from Barb Fuller



If you attended the Rally Day ice cream social in September and stayed to listen to The Wacoustics, the musical group (of which I am one) that several of our church members and their family members are a part of, you may remember that our parting song was "The Twist". If you're like me, you may have thought that "The Twist" was originally sung by Chubby Checker, but it peaked at No. 16 on the Billboard rhythm and blues chart in 1959 when it was recorded by its author, Hank Ballard, whose band The Midnighters performed it on stage.

Chubby Checker, born Ernest Evans, was born on October 1941 in Spring Gully, South Carolina. He was raised in the projects of South Philadelphia, where he lived with his parents and two brothers. By the time he was eleven he had formed a street-corner harmony group, and by the time he entered high school, he had learned to play the piano. He entertained his classmates by performing vocal impressions of popular entertainers such as Jerry Lee Lewis, Elvis Presley and Fats Domino.

Checker's version of "The Twist" became a nationwide hit in 1960 due to his many appearances on Dick Clark's American Bandstand due, in great part, to the teenagers on the show who enjoyed dancing the Twist. Unfortunately, Checker felt that his critics thought he could only succeed as a dance demonstrator and is quoted as saying, "The Twist really ruined my life. I was on my way to becoming a big nightclub performer, and The Twist just wiped it out ... It got so out of proportion. No one ever believes I have talent." By 1965 alone "The Twist" had sold over 15 million copies and was awarded multiple gold discs.

Despite his concerns, Checker found more success with other uptempo songs including "The Hucklebuck," "The Fly," "Dance the Mess Around," and "Pony Time," which became his second No. 1 single. Checker's follow-up single, "Let's Twist Again" won the 1962 Grammy Award for Best Rock and Roll Recording, and he continued to experience more success with subsequent songs.

Chubby Checker is still alive today. As of 2015, he joined forces with Howard Perl Entertainment to produce live events, such as "Rock and Roll to The Rescue," a tour designed to raise funds for rescue animals in need nationwide. Good old Chubby Checker. "Let's twist again, like we did last summer!"
